I have an avid interest in acknowledging the history, culture and traditional knowledge of First Nation, Métis and Inuit (FNMI) people in Canada. I have always had a passion for teaching. I am an avid learner myself, and I worked as a tutor for students from kindergarten to grade 12.

I am currently in my fifth year of teaching at Mother Earth's Children's Charter School. 
I am at MECCS for so many reasons: I love the kids, I love the sense of community and I love the people I get to work with every day.




memory isn't one thing in particular but an overall feeling.
